INTRO TO RADIO JOURNALISM WORKSHOP APPLICATION

In this fun, challenging, and hands-on workshop, teens learn radio journalism and storytelling skills, build confidence, and work with others while creating podcasts and radio stories on topics of their choice. The 2023 workshop will be hybrid, with some days online and some in-person. It will run from **Monday**, **July 10 through Wednesday**, **August 9**, **2023**, plus two online prep meetings June 28th & July 5th and a public listening event in August.

RadioActive is a program of KUOW 94.9 Public Radio. This workshop is a **PAID** opportunity open to teens ages 15-18 in the greater Seattle area (King, Pierce, Snohomish, and Kitsap counties). It is also the entry point to RadioActive's Advanced Producers program, a year-round opportunity to collaborate on youth-led radio productions.

RadioActive is a public radio journalism discovery program. We prioritize youth who do not already have access to robust journalism, arts, and media programs.

- You're ready to try new things: No journalism experience required!

- By finishing this workshop, you earn the opportunity to keep making radio at KUOW as an advanced producer.

SHARE A STORY IDEA!

In this RadioActive workshop, you'll learn how to tell a TRUE story about one person using sound. So, share a story idea with us! That means write about a true story from your life or community that you want to tell, and that other people will want to hear. "True" means the story idea you share is about real people and real events and is not fiction or made up. Your story should focus on at least one main character who you could interview this summer.

What touches your heart, inspires you, confuses you, or makes you mad? What do people need to hear about? Who do you want to learn more about? **The best stories are the ones that you care about.**

Your story idea should include:

- Who your story is about
- What they are doing in your story
- Why they are doing that (their **motivation**)
- Why do you think your story will **hold listeners' attention**?
- In addition to your interview, what other sounds will you record?
- What do you hope to learn by telling this story? Why do you want to tell this story?

STORY IDEA EXAMPLE (from a past workshop application):

My story will be about my mom. What my mom is doing is trying to reteach me and my siblings how to speak and write Somali properly.

My mom is always calling us Somalia's lost generation. She says we came to America too young to have a culture and mother tongue to hold onto and that we need to learn now so that we can pass our culture and language on to our children. I think my story will hold listeners attention because people can relate to losing not only their mother tongue or culture but even family traditions that your parents may have made. We all have things we used to do with our families when we were young that we may have stopped doing, not because we forgot but because we just didn't want to take the time to do it.

The sounds I'd record would be my mother saying a word and me and my siblings repeating it to learn, me and my siblings speaking in broken Somali, and my mom and aunts speaking fluently in Somali.

I hope to learn why so many first-generation immigrants have a hard time holding on to their culture and ways for us to connect to our cultures and languages without losing what we've learned of American culture and the English language. I want to tell this story because I think people feel ashamed of not being able to speak to their parents or grandparents, and not being able to connect to them the way they could if language/cultural norms weren't different. It's important to talk about the problems in day-to-day life for immigrants to help ease the process of moving and to show that there are people like them in the media.
